• STRENGTH: Sport and academic recognition of local students. This sets our club apart from all the others. WEAK-NESS: Need more member participation (i.e. planning fund raisers, volunteering for office positions, providing ideas on how to increase membership, etc.).

 STRENGTH: Positive community involvement. WEAKNESS: Commitment from RINOs who don't participate and achieving an increased membership goal.

• STRENGTH: Huge improvement in the bulletin so the members really have an idea about what is going on. WEAKNESS: We need more members who want to be active.

• STRENGTH: Relaxed, flexible, fun atmosphere. WEAKNESS: Adherence to 1-hour time frame (Ed. note: Meetings have never been restricted to one hour.

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but have always been based on 1.5 hours or less)

• STRENGTH: Informal attitude of the club and the support it gives for college scholarships, grants and other activities that benefit the community. WEAKNESS: What appears to be somewhat of a lack of organization in club leadership.

 STRENGTH: Knowledge about Rotary. WEAKNESS: Membership size and attendance at meetings.

• STRENGTH: Following the principles

of Rotary. WEAKNESS: Lack of social activities so members can get to know one another - especially newer members.

• STRENGTH: The dedicated core of Wenatchee North Rotarians. WEAK-NESS: Not enough young or new member participation.

• STRENGTH: Longevity of members dedicated to the Sports Awards project. WEAKNESS: Age of members; lack of new members; lack of female members; few community service projects.
