

Community Harvest helps farmers manage their excess and un-marketable products, and makes gleaned produce accessible to the local community and food banks. Hannah explained the many ways Community Harvest obtains the produce: gleaning, farmers or individuals donating (or leasing) land for growing, and donations. This is only the 2nd year of the program but so far about 12,000 lbs. of fruit and produce have been provided this year.
