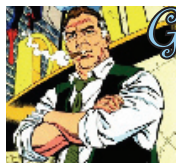

What were they thinking by adopting North Poll as the name of this newsletter?

The name of the *Wenatchee North Poll* newsletter goes back to the very early days of the club. Obviously meant as a play on words, it has occasionally served to survey member opinion, but that certainly hasn't been the publication's main function. Instead, *North Poll* was more likely a playful 'sound alike' befitting the original persona of what was referred to as "the young man's Rotary club."

The publication's original logo, possibly created by Joe Anderson or Leonard Noss and used for about 25 years, depicted a grinning Eskimo seated on an iceberg under a blazing sun, holding an ice cold beverage. For the most part, it mimicked the light-hearted, casual nature of meetings definitely not typical of Rotary clubs back in 1969 - a rather unique characteristic that has survived for almost 45 years.

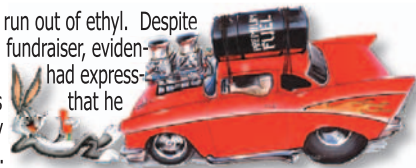

In our usual top-down effort to get to the bottom of breaking developments before issues go entirely bottoms-up, one of our crack investigative reporters uncovered the intention of Jeff Mertes to retire from the ranks of Wenatchee North Rotary effective December 31, 2013.

It's been a high octane 37-year journey at about 100 miles per hour along the Rotary highway for Mertes, a.k.a. Ryan O'Ralphie. During the road trip, there's evidence that he laid rubber throughout the spectrum of Wenatchee North activities. Our reporter caught-up with an unnamed source, a fly on a skillet himself, who accused the driver of never sleeping. Indeed, allegations of late night joy riding on behalf of the organization are irrefutable.

Now it appears the ol' hot rod has run out of ethyl. Despite the success of the Sports Awards as a fundraiser, evidence has come to light revealing Mertes had expressed a fear to confidants in recent years that he had created a "monster" with the only way to escape being to die...or resign. Assured that he shouldn't feel guilty after 37-years of service, the latter has evidently been chosen.



Mertes indicated a desire to reclaim about two months of free time each year that had been devoted to the Sports Awards realizing, at his 'advanced' age, there may not be all that many Mays and Junes left to go. Among his immediate plans to fill the void are to retrace the steps his grandfather took in June of 1896 over the Chillkoot Trail and on to Dawson City for the Klondike Gold Rush, and to attempt to lower his average cost for a round of golf at WG&CC from about \$400 to less than \$100.

When reached for comment, Mertes said, "I'm proud to have been a Wenatchee North Rotarian. For a club its size, Wenatchee North has consistently accomplished more than would be considered typical in the Rotary world. A most important value of Rotary, as far as I'm concerned, is embedded in the original reason Paul Harris founded the organization in 1905 - the interpersonal relationships that are developed in what can be an impersonal world. The rest is just gravy."

Of course, the biggest winners will be the recipients of college scholarships that result from Wenatchee North Rotarians participating in the competition.

Fine Master Joe Gamboni enlightened the group with several deserving recognitions: we will all sorely miss our departing fellow Rotarians Gordi Northrup, Phil Johnson and Jim Haglund; Dave Doerr easily won a Norwegian speaking contest over Earl 'the toiler' Tilly.
